

Current Projects

Jacob Riyeff, ObISB,

Visiting Assistant Professor at Marquette University, is currently finishing work on his book-length translation of Swami Abhishiktananda's (Henri Le Saux, OSB) collected poems, a project commissioned by the Swami Abhishiktananda Centre for Interreligious Dialogue in Rishikesh, India. In addition, his translation of St. Æthelwold of Winchester's Old English version of the Rule of St. Benedict is now slated to appear in the Fall of 2017 from Cistercian Publications. He is also continuing work on two anonymous Latin treatises for novices from a fourteenth-century manuscript of the monastery, Bury St. Edmunds in England. Jacob's monograph project on meditative verse prayers in Old English, found in largely monastic manuscripts of the tenth and eleventh centuries, is in renewed progress as well.




SWAMI ABHISHIKTANANDA (Henri Le Saux, OSB)

Colleen McGrane, OSB, reports that she is finishing preparation for classes to be given during the RB Study Weeks for Benedictines in the Philippines, October 28 to Nov. 12.

Judith Valente, ObISB, has received a contract from Hampton Roads Publishers, (an imprint of Red Wheels/ Weiser Publishing), to write a book of 52 reflections on the Benedictine *Rule*, geared toward the working person. She reports that the tentative title is "Simplicity and Silence: Meditations on Happiness, Meaning and *The Rule of St. Benedict.*" Publication date is set for spring of 2018.

Martin Shannon, CJ, writes that Paraclete Press has just published his small book of reflections on 24 scriptural accounts of angelic visitations, entitled All God's Angels: Loving and Learning from Angelic Messengers. Each reflection draws on the biblical story, and also on the interpretation given to it by a selected piece of art, which is included in the book. He writes further: "I've also just submitted an essay to be included in The Ecumenism of Beauty, a collection of essays on aesthetics and theology by Catholic and Protestant scholars and artists, to be published by Mount Tabor books in observance of the 500th anniversary of the Reformation in 2017. My



essay is entitled, "Beauty in and of the Church" -- a look at the place of art in liturgy, using The Church of the Transfiguration (of the Community of Jesus) as an illustration."

Tom Piazza, Richmond, CA. and Sr. Felicitas Seisenberger, OSB, Abtei Venio, Munich, are continuing their project to digitize and analyze the Catalogus information on Benedictine women. They have recently completed the analysis of the data on the Bavarian Federation from 1990-2014. Statistical charts that accompany the narrative show interesting membership trends by years of age and of profession. The report, entitled "Trends in Membership for Benedictine Women in the Bavarian Benedictine Federation," is currently under review for possible publication in ABR. They are now digitizing the data on another congregation, and hope to complete that analysis by the spring of 2017.

Joel Rippinger, OSB, writes: "I am interested in trying to coordinate in some electronic forum the necrologies of American Benedictine communities. These would include death notices and more extended obituaries/ eulogies. Most of our houses have these and they constitute, I believe, an invaluable tool for any historians seeking to understand the history of our communities."

High Feiss, OSB, reports: "Three projects are finished and pending publication. (1) an article on Robert of La Chaise-Dieu and the issues of action/contemplation, work/prayer, to appear in the December 2016 issue of the American Benedictine Review. I think the contemplation/action dichotomy is confused and not

very helpful as illustrated from a consideration of Robert of the La Chaise-Dieu's life. (2) I also explore Robert's understanding of authority in monastic polity (Bible, Rule, Customary, tradition) in a chapter I am contributing to a forthcoming book on Christianity and Law in the West. In it I argue that for Robert the Gospel was the primary authority. In the rest of the article I explore the ideas about law in the RM and RB and how the monks of the monastery at Fulda appealed to law and tradition in the Supplex libellus. (3) I have submitted a chapter on eschatology and mysticism for an encyclopedia on mysticism. I focus on Benedict's vision at the end of his life, St. Bernard's idea about the incomplete fulfillment of the blessed prior to the resurrection, and

Teilahrd de Chardin's mysticism of matter."

•The ABA session for Kalamazoo 2017 is set. There will be four papers on the interplay of four authorities (Bible, Rule, Customary and tradition) in the self-understanding of medieval Benedictine monks. S. Colleen Maura McGrane of Cylde MO, is one of the presenters.

Laura Dunham, Oblate of Saint Benedict's Monastery, St. Joseph, MN, writes: "I am at work on a book tentatively titled "Extraordinary Time: Spiritual Reflections from a Season with Cancer.
